
THE DUBUQUE CHORALE PRESENTS OLYMPIC DREAMS





A Message from Mark Niemer Dubuque Chorale President

Thank you for joining us to joyfully celebrate the Dubuque Chorale and Children's Choirs Olympic Dreams concert. This summer we witnessed competition and triumph at the Summer Olympics and Paralympics. We incorporated this into our concert, including popular music and recently composed choral music. Feel the excitement of the music, tap your foot, and smile on our Olympic journey.

The Dubuque Chorale performs under the direction of Dr. Amanda Huntleigh (Artistic Director) and Than Chesher (Associate Director). Karmella Sellers has directed the Children's Choirs Program since its inception in 2014. She has been very influential in developing young singers and giving them the skills they need to grow their talent and confidence. We have seen the program expand to two choirs, the younger Staccati Singers (Victoria Bausman conducting) and the older Legati Singers (Karmella Sellers conducting). The Children's Choirs directors provide a strong and positive influence for our children and we are extremely grateful for their dedicated leadership.

The Chorale continues to work with the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra in December for the Holiday Pops Concert. We have previously performed Johannes Brahms' *A German Requiem* with the DSO and several members of the Chorale also performed in the DSO production of Mozart's *The Magic Flute*. In 2023 we performed Bruckner's Mass in E minor at Clarke University with the Julien Winds and Clarke University Wind Ensemble. On February 8, 2025, we will perform Mozart's Requiem at Five Flags Theater in conjunction with the Dubuque Youth Symphony Orchestra. Please join us for the performance of this masterwork.

Our concerts, organizational growth, and innovative programming would not be possible without the support of our corporate, government, and foundation sponsors, and the many individuals who contribute to our operating and endowment funds every year. Dr. Amanda Huntleigh is Artistic



Director of the Dubuque Chorale, and serves as Associate Professor of Music and Director of Choral Activities at Clarke University.

Huntleigh holds a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in choral conducting from the University of Washington, a Master of Music degree in conducting from George Mason University, and a Bachelor of Music Education degree from Wartburg College. In January 2016 she earned her certification as a Laban/ Bartenieff Movement Analyst through Integrated Movement Studies. She is thankful for her conducting mentors, Drs. Lisa A. Billingham, Geoffrey Boers, and Giselle Wyers, as well as her movement mentors, Colleen Wahl and the late Cadence Whittier. Huntleigh has conducted choirs touring in Chile, Iceland, Italy, and Latvia, and taught choral, instrumental, and general music in Illinois, Virginia, and Delaware public schools earlier in her career.

KARMELLA SELLERS is the Children's



Choirs Program Director for the Dubuque Chorale and conducts the Legati Singers, the more advanced of the two Children's Choirs.

Having been a music educator for over 34 years, she brings a wealth of experience with her to this position and firmly believes that music not only enriches lives, but also teaches discipline, teamwork, and responsibility. As a music specialist in the Dubuque Community School District since 2005, she has served the community through teaching elementary children about the wonders of music and choral singing.

Sellers is originally from Los Angeles, California. She received her Bachelor of Music Education from Grand Canyon University (Phoenix, Arizona) and her Masters in Elementary Education from Northern Arizona University. In 2009, Sellers achieved National Board Certification

When she is not sharing in music-making with children, Sellers likes to read, to travel with her husband, Rory, and to spend time with her grown children and not-so-grown grandchildren.

VICTORIA BAUSMAN is the director of



the Staccati Singers of the Dubuque Chorale Children's Choirs. In addition to directing the Staccati Singers, Bausman teaches K-5 General Music at Bel-

levue Elementary School. Apart from teaching and directing, Bausman enjoys singing with the Dubuque Chorale and Cadenza.

Bausman earned a Bachelor's degree in Music Education as well as a Vocal Performance Certificate at Elmhurst University in Elmhurst, IL. During her studies, Bausman had multiple opportunities to travel to other countries, such as Jamaica, Austria, and the Czech Republic, to widen her horizons as well as further her experience in music and teaching. Prior to teaching in Bellevue, Bausman was the general music teacher and choral director at Galena Middle School and Galena High School.

THAN CHESHER is the associate direc-



tor for the Dubuque Chorale. In addition to the Dubuque Chorale, Chesher directs the choirs of Dubuque Senior High School and teaches a

Modern Band class introducing students to contemporary instruments and recording techniques. He has directed choirs in Iowa and Minnesota, where students earned honors in conference, state, and national honor choirs.

Chesher comes to Dubuque with 28 years of professional musical experience performing for amusement parks, cruise ships, and onstage as a vocalist and bassist. His academic research includes individual well-being through music, student musician identity, and popular music in schools. Chesher received his Master of Arts in Music Education from the University of Iowa and his Bachelor of Music Education from Morningside College.

Dr. Sharon Jensen holds music degrees



from Calvin College, the University of Texas, and the University of Michigan. The recipient of a Rotary Fellowship, she studied at the Hochschule für

Musik in Vienna, Austria, where she received the Artist's Diploma.

She has performed with orchestras throughout the Midwest and at Carnegie's Weill Recital Hall for four consecutive years. In July 2016, she was a pianist for the Prague Choral Festival and performed with members of the Czech Philharmonic in Smetana Hall. Jensen has also been heard on Chicago's WFMT Dame Myra Hess series and NPR's Live from Landmark Center and Live from the Chazen.

Recently retired from a 35-year university teaching career, Jensen maintains a piano studio in Dubuque, IA. In 2015, she was honored as the Nationally Certified Teacher of the Year from the state of Iowa and in 2020 as the Iowa Foundation Fellow.

AMANDA HAUTA, MM, is an adjunct



professor at the University of Dubuque where she has taught World Music. She sings with

the Julien Chamber Choir and teaches piano and accordion lessons. She loves accompanying the Dubuque Chorale Children's Choirs. She completed a Bachelor of Music degree in vocal performance from the University of Northern Colorado and a Master of Music degree from the University of Minnesota Duluth. Hauta's current project is learning how to play bagpipes with the Dubuque Fire Pipes and Drums. She lives in Dubuque with her husband and two sons.

Brazilian pianist Dr. Keisy Peyerl XAVIER has established herself as a



distinguished solo and collaborative pianist. With a diverse artistic background and a robust foundation in Classical piano, Peyerl Xavier's journey culminated in the attainment

of a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Piano Performance from the University of Southern Mississippi, complementing her earlier degrees obtained in her homeland. Peyerl Xavier's accomplishments include clinching First Prize in the MMTA Collegiate Competition and securing high positions in prestigious contests, like the "National Piano Competition from the Brazilian Academy of Music" in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. She has enriched her skills through masterclasses with eminent pianists globally, from École Normale de Musique de Paris, the San Francisco Opera Center, and Bayerische Staatsoper in Munich, Germany. Currently Assistant Professor of Music and Collaborative Pianist at Clarke University, Peyerl Xavier's achievements are amplified through her dynamic artistry and profound connection to music.

Embrace Your Olympic Dreams with the Dubuque Chorale

Five rings, a torch, and the sound of a fanfare—these are some of the most recognizable symbols of the Olympic Games. The Games themselves symbolize international friendship, human excellence, perseverance, and teamwork. In celebration of these ideals, the Dubuque Chorale, their chamber choir Cadenza, and both Dubuque Chorale Children's Choirs present their fall concert, *Olympic Dreams*.

The Olympic theme is fitting for 2024, not only due to the recent Summer Olympic and Paralympic Games in Paris, but also because this year marks the 100th anniversary of the Winter Olympic Games, which began in the Alpine town of Chamonix, France, in 1924. In celebrating this milestone, this concert invites the Dubuque community to reflect on how the spirit of the Games can inspire us in all aspects of life.

Dubuque Chorale Artistic Director Dr. Amanda Huntleigh says, "Olympic Dreams is about committing to work toward a goal with hope. It is about dreaming what might be possible..., finding inner strength to work toward it, and sticking it out, especially when it is challenging." The same spirit that drives Olympians can inspire people to pursue excellence in all their endeavors, including the arts. According to Dr. Huntleigh, "All expertise requires tens of thousands of hours of practice to achieve. That is true for elite athletes and professional musicians alike."

The practice of music and sport both require dedication to training the mind and body, as well as working as a team to achieve a common goal. Victoria Bausman, director of

one of the Children's Choirs, says that one aspect she loves about choral music is that it requires collaboration, "Each person's voice, each person's practice and participation matters, but it's what it adds to the group that is the main focus."

Throughout the history of the modern games, music has played a special role, from soundtracking events like figure skating and the newly introduced breaking, to celebrating the cultural identity of the host nation. In our program, *Waltzing Matilda* serves as a tribute to Australia, honoring its role as the host of the Olympics both in 1956 and 2000. This iconic song reflects the spirit of the nation and celebrates its rich cultural heritage, reminding us of the vibrant community and diverse identity that welcomed athletes from around the world. Music itself can serve as a symbol of the games, as in compositions like Leo Arnaud's "Bugler's Dream," John Williams' "Olympic Fanfare and Theme," and the titular theme from *Chariots of Fire*. Audiences may recognize some of these familiar themes played by trumpeter Dr. Amy Dunker as transitions within the program.

Iconic performances from the history of the games inspire athletes and spectators alike to embrace the Olympic spirit. The Legati Singers will remind audiences of one such performance with their rendition of Gloria Estefan's "Reach." "It is an iconic tune that brings me back to 1996 whenever I hear it," says Karmella Sellers, program director for the Dubuque Chorale Children's Choirs. "Music and sport are two fields where grit, determination and practice are needed to succeed.... I hope [this] becomes a song of encouragement for our singers." In addition to songs performed at the games, the concert features music that captures the Olympic spirit, such as "Go the Distance" from Disney's *Hercules* and "Heroes," by David Bowie and Brian Eno. Libby Larsen's bustling *Look! Be: leap*; performed by the Chorale treble voices portrays the exhilaration of pursuing one's passions. Our finale, sung by the combined choirs, challenges the listener to reach for their own dreams, to "chase the wind and touch the sky."

We hope this program inspires you to reflect on your own dreams, whatever they may be, and pursue them with the conviction, courage, and tenacity of an Olympian.

Our spring concert, Books and Ballads, will include a free-will offering of new or gently used books for use by kindergarten-ninth grade students in Enchi, Ghana.

History of the Dubuque Chorale

The Dubuque Chorale is a community choral organization of singers from Dubuque and outlying communities. Dennis Williams founded the group in 1971. The chorale's initial purpose was to study and perform the great choral masterworks with orchestra; the first season featured Handel's Messiah and Haydn's Creation. Since then, the group has performed over 60 major choral works, and its mission has evolved to include all great choral music. The Chorale's 50+ years of performances, with over 1,100 singer alumni reaching more than 40,000 audience members, attests to the accomplishment of this mission.

In 1986, the Chorale began collaborating with the Dubuque Symphony Orchestra with the performance of that year's Holiday Concerts. The relationship continues today, with the Chorale joining the DSO for Holiday Pops and frequently for another featured work during the season as part of the symphony's subscription series. The Chorale also presents its own concerts in the fall and spring, and additional engagements as requested.

Since 1994, the Dubuque Chorale has toured to England and Wales, Germany, Austria, the Czech Republic, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Russia, Italy, Switzerland, New Zealand, and Australia. More recent tours included New York City, the British Isles, and Montreal, Canada. The Chorale toured and performed with singers from the Wisconsin communities of Platteville, Mt. Horeb, and Fond du Lac.

Upon Dennis Williams' retirement, Francis John Vogt served as artistic director from 2006 to 2009, with Dr. Bob Demaree in the position from 2009 to 2018.

In the fall of 2012, the Dubuque Chorale added a chamber choir, Cadenza. This mixed-voice group of 16-24 singers is designed to give the Chorale greater flexibility in booking performance engagements, increasing the Chorale's exposure as a community arts leader and advocate. The group makes presentations at community service organizations and other community events. It also performs pieces at regular Chorale concerts.

The beginning of the 2014-15 season included the launch of the Dubuque Chorale Children's Choir, a group of approximately 50 singers in third through sixth grades. In 2022, a second children's choir was added. The purpose of the Children's Choirs is to provide a creative outlet outside of the regular school day for children of Dubuque and surrounding areas, to expose students to new music and performance opportunities they may not have in school, and to give them the opportunity to interact and form relationships with other children and adults from their community who are dedicated to choral excellence.

The Chorale's current Artistic Director, Dr. Amanda Huntleigh, began her tenure in 2018. The Chorale has grown to include singers with a diverse array of occupations, ages, and socio-economic statuses. Since its founding, the Chorale's repertoire and artistic programming has also expanded to include new collaborations and community educational opportunities.

The Chorale continues its exciting programming under Huntleigh's inspired direction, seeking out new collaborations with community groups and expanding its repertoire of classics and new music.
